Biographical Sketch

William Henry Ireland was born in 1775 in London, son of Samuel Ireland, a printer, engraver, and writer, and his housekeeper, Anna Maria de Burgh Coppinger, also a writer, alias Mrs. Freeman.

The family were avid admirers of Shakespeare, and at the age of nineteen, William Henry, whom his father regarded as stupid, "found" supposed Shakespeare autograph documents, including a letter to Anne Hathaway, a note from Queen Elizabeth, manuscript pages of *King Lear* and *Hamlet*, and a complete "lost" play, *Vortigern and Rowena*. Ireland's father eagerly accepted these as genuine, exhibited them to the public, and published facsimiles in 1795.

Some prominent enthusiasts were fooled, but the forgeries were soon discovered. In 1796 Edmund Malone published a detailed exposé, days before Richard Brinsley Sheridan staged a production of *Vortigern*. The performance was a disaster. The young Ireland immediately published a confession for the forgeries, exonerating his father.

For the rest of his life, Ireland used the scandal and his notoriety to supplement his income as a writer of romances, ballads, histories, and biographies. These include a life of Napoleon, a "memoir" of Joan of Arc, and effusions by the court poet of Mary, Queen of Scots. In 1805 Ireland published his *Confessions*, with detailed descriptions of his motives, techniques, and mistakes as a forger. He soon began fabricating and selling bound albums containing pieces of his "original" forgeries and later fakes, printed facsimiles and editions of the documents, and autograph references to relevant passages in his *Confessions*. These albums have a self-promoting theme, collecting scraps of family correspondence, prints and drawings, family armorial bearings, and writings by his parents, some embellished by hand with ornamental borders. Ireland spent time in debtors' prison (1811), and most of a decade (1814-23) in France, writing about French history. He died in London, April 17, 1835

Scope and Contents

A single folio volume contains mounted and bound-in documents, starting with several of William Henry Ireland's "original" forgeries of Shakespeare's signature, letters and verses to Anne Hathaway and others, and signatures and business papers of his associates. Some are accompanied with printed versions of the manuscript materials, and with Ireland's autograph notes making references to relevant pages in his *Confessions*. Ireland includes printed pages from his "discovered" versions of *King Lear, Hamlet (Hamblette)* and *Vortigern*, and miscellaneous writings, prints, and drawings of his family. A complete copy of his mother's printed ballad, "The Doctor Dissected," concludes the volume.
